In the reference read above, the Project Director, Tamil Nadu Health System Reform Program has stated that Tamil Nadu Health System Reform Program is being implemented by Government of Tamil Nadu with funding support from World Bank. As per the loan agreement the project will be funded under Program for Results mode, that is, the funds will be disbursed based on the achievement of pre-defined Disbursement Linked Indicators (DLI) in respect of the project activities. The following are the activities which are linked to disbursement for year one of the Project.

 To carryout Gap Analysis and to work out the Facility Improvement Plan for 300 Primary Health Centres, 75 Secondary care Health facilities and 7 Medical College Hospitals for obtaining NQAS/NABH accreditation.

- 2. The Project Director, Tamil Nadu Health System Reform Program has stated that Tamil Nadu (TN) is the pioneering State in providing public healthcare facilities in India. The State also has arobust private sector and hence viewed as the ultimate health care destination in India. Tamil Nadu's strong public health system still has many gaps and challenges that need a renewed policy thrust. There is a need to further strengthen public services at all levels of care, address the lacunas in providing quality of care and bringing community ownership and equity-based healthcare delivery.
- 3. The Project Director, Tamil Nadu Health System Reform Program has stated that the current Tamil Nadu State Health Policy (TNSHP-2030) embraces a systems approach to address the current issues and foreseen challenges in the health sector in the State by creating a necessary policy framework. The policy document has been developed taking into account the Global Burden of Diseases (GBD) Report, 2016- *India: Health of the Nation's States The India State-Level Disease Burden Initiative*, National Health Policy 2017, Government of India, targets set in Sustainable Development goals (SDG) and Vision 2023 & 2030 Document of the Government of Tamil Nadu.
